

NON-PRICING ORGANIZATIONS FOR CHILD AND ADULT CARE FOOD PROGRAM

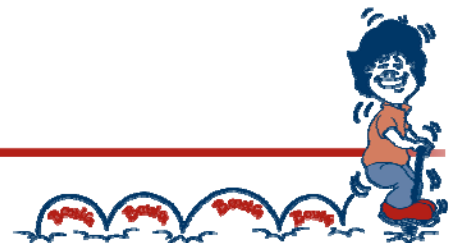
Children who are members of households that receive TANF or Food Stamp benefits, are Head Start Participants, or are Foster children are automatically eligible to receive free meal benefits.
